### Regional Summary of Week 28 and Outlook for Week 29

- Recorded events in Week 28 are still largely hydro-meteorological in nature. As reported by [ASEAN Specialised Meteorological Centre](#), the [Southwest Monsoon has brought about dry conditions over many parts of Southern ASEAN and it is expected to last till October 2018](#). This is consistent with the drought occurring on Java Island and the various floods in the Mid and Northern ASEAN region.
- There were eight moderate earthquakes registered  $\geq M 4.0$  recorded in Indonesia ([BMKG](#)). A rare  $M 4.2$  earthquake was recorded in southern Borneo on 12 July 2018, with intensity reported around III-IV MMI; the epicentre was outside of the country seismic hazard zones. Meanwhile, a very shallow  $M 4.8$  earthquake (epicentre at 2 km below ground surface) struck Lebak regency, Banten Province, on 15 July 2018. In Philippines, three moderate earthquakes registered  $\geq M 4.0$  were reported ([PHIVOLCS](#)). No casualties and damages reported by any of the earthquakes in ASEAN region throughout Week 28.
- On volcanoes across the region. In Indonesia, Alert Level IV (out of maximum IV) maintained for Mount Sinabung and Alert Level III maintained for Mount Agung, despite eruptions on 9 and 15 July 2018. Despite an increased of activities in Mount Anak Krakatau in Sunda Strait, with 398 tremors, Alert Level II is maintained ([PVMBG](#)). In Philippines, [PHIVOLCS](#) maintains Alert Level 2 (out of maximum 5) for Mount Mayon and Kanlaon.
- Entering Week 29, Philippines is on alert to the movement of Tropical Depression Eleven (Henry) as it has slightly accelerated and moves westward towards Babuyan Group of Islands in Northern Luzon. It will also bring heavy rainfall over the rest of Luzon ([PAGASA, NDRRMC](#)).
- All disasters occurred in Week 28 were within the capacity of respective ASEAN Member States.
