Regional Summary of Week 41, and Outlook for Week 42

- 1) In Week 41, the reported disasters are largely due to the changes in season from Southwest to Northeast Monsoon. Southwestern parts of ASEAN has started to transit from the dry season to rainy season which resulted in the landslides and flash floods experienced in western Peninsula Malaysia and Sumatra. In addition the disasters reported, AHA Centre also monitored several strong winds and occasional heavy rainfall in Java and Sulawesi Island, Indonesia, it was not caused major disturbance to the population.
- 2) AHA Centre is engaging in emergency response to the M 7.4 Central Sulawesi Earthquake following the welcome of international assistance by Government of Indonesia. Follow our regular updates here: <https://ahacentre.org/indonesia-central-sulawesi-m-7-4-earthquake-and-tsunami-updates/>. The M 6.4 in East Java (11 Oct) did not caused major damages.
- 3) Viet Nam NCHMF has issued warning for Northern region. Low pressure area is being monitored in the Bay of Bengal as cyclone season is due to start in late October through to November ([DMRS](#)).
- 4) In Week 41, there were increased activities in Mt. Soputan (North Sulawesi), Mt. Anak Krakatoa (Sunda Strait) and Mt. Gamalama (North Maluku) ([BG-PVMBG](#)). BG-PVMBG elevated Alert Level of Mt. Soputan from Alert II to III as of 4 Oct, thus Permanent danger zone was set for 4 km radius from the tip of volcano, with extension up to 6.5 km towards southwest direction. Mt. Sinabung remains at Alert Level IV and Mt. Agung at Alert Level III. To date, there is no major risk to operations in Central Sulawesi. There is no change to status of volcanoes in Philippines ([PHIVOLCS](#)).
- 5) ASEAN Specialised Meteorological Centre ([ASMC](#)) released the updated seasonal forecast for October-December 2018. Over the next one to two weeks, rainy weather is forecast over most parts of Sumatra and Kalimantan, with brief, interspersed periods of dry weather in the southern parts of Sumatra and Kalimantan. Hotspot activities in the southern ASEAN region are thus expected to be generally subdued during this period.
- 6) Aside from Central Sulawesi Earthquake & Tsunami, all the remaining disasters occurred in Week 41 were within the capacity of each Member State.
