FLOODING AND LANDSLIDE IN WEST JAVA, INDONESIA FLASH UPDATE #1

Indonesia

- According to the report from Indonesia's Badan Nasional Penanggulangan Bencana ([BNPB](#)), the flooding and landslides triggered by high intensity rain since 4 February 2021 has affected **Indramayu, Sumedang, Subang, Bogor, Cirebon, Majalengka, Karawang Regency** and **Bekasi City**, West Java Province.
- Indonesia's Badan Nasional Penanggulangan Bencana ([BNPB](#)) reported that as many as **156.8K people** were affected by the flood and landslides, with around 63.7K people displaced.
- Eight (8) regencies / cities were affected by the flood in West Java since 7 February 2021:
 - Indramayu - **39,631 people affected, 11,997 displaced and 6,250 houses damaged;**
 - Sumedang - **706 people affected and 170 houses damaged;**
 - Subang - **62,070 people affected, 38,453 displaced, and 19,211 houses damaged;**
 - Bogor - **9,528 people affected, 9,528 displaced, and 1,932 houses damaged;**
 - Cirebon - **600 people affected;**
 - Majalengka - **6,293 people affected, 861 displaced, and 2,706 houses damaged;**
 - Karawang - **37,474 people affected and 3,004 houses damaged;**
 - Bekasi City - **575 people affected and 151 houses damaged;**
- According to [BNPB](#), high intensity rain on 7 February 2021 caused landslides in 12 locations in Subang Regency, West Java Province
- Local Disaster Management Agencies (BPBD) and other related agencies are coordinating to do rapid assessments, continue with data collection, evacuate the affected people, and provide victims' needs.
- The AHA Centre will continue to monitor for further developments and issue necessary updates.
